Mayor updates community on recent projects

I have been asked by a number of residents to give an update on some of the projects going on in the City.

State Street Water main project

First let me start with some of the infrastructure projects. The upgrade of the **South State Street** water main to 12" is completed. This upgrade, along with the upgrade of the water main along Mill Street that was complete last year, will provide a much needed increase of water flow to the south-central part of the City. This is important to maintain flows for fire protection and should help with water quality in the area. There are still some shorter runs scheduled for upgrade in the coming year.

New water treatment facility online

The final water treatment facility is scheduled to go on line in mid- October. With this new facility going into operation, the City will now be in compliance with the final standards for radium removal set by the EPA. In fact, this should be the last newsletter that contains the radium statement. Also, this summer the two wells at Grand Reserve were connected into the main system which brings the production and storage capacity of the City to service a population up to approximately 45,000 people. Several of the

proposed new developments are also required to provide additional wells, towers, and treatment facilities.

In-town road program

Plans for the next phase of the In-Town Road program is progressing. This winter bids will be accepted for additional utility work. Bids for street construction are scheduled to be accepted from mid to late spring. The streets included in this phase are Hydraulic Street, Mill Street (Hydraulic to Washington), Heustis Street (Hydraulic to Fox) Fox and Washington Streets (from Mill east to their end) Orange Street (from South Main to Mill), Van Emmon Street (Morgan to State), Morgan (from Hydraulic to Madison), Madison (from Morgan Street to South Main) and Adam Street (from Hydraulic to Ridge). Road work on Countryside Parkway from Center Parkway to East Kendall is complete. Engineering is continuing for the upgrade to Somonauk/Game Farm Road. (continued on page 2)

Mayor challenges community to submit ideas for monument

During the city's fourth annual Patriots Walk, **Mayor Art Prochaska** challenged the community to submit ideas for a monument to honor those individuals who serve in our emergency services and the victims of Sept. 11. "I challenge the community to send their ideas, their support and their offers to City Hall," Prochaska said, at Town Square Park, where among 100 residents gathered

to take

a few moments out of their day to remember those who lost their lives in the tragedy. Also, the landowner to the west of the Kendall Marketplace has submitted a concept plan with an additional shopping center, a continuous care senior housing development, a residential component and further continuation of the Beecher Road extension.

Wal-Mart is going through final review of their project at Veterans Parkway and Countryside and plans to begin construction early

next spring.

(Mayor's message continued) The City is looking to begin engineering for the installation of traffic signals at Sycamore Street and Veterans Parkway (Rt. 34) now that IDOT has concurred with the city's warrant analysis. IDOT has begun work on the re-alignment and upgrade to the intersection of Schoolhouse Road (Rt. 126) and Stagecoach Trail (Rt. 71). I have been in contact with our local state legislators, and they have informed me that they are hoping to see a compromised capital budget passed by the General Assembly that will contain funds for Rt. 47. Finally, there will be improvements and upgrades to various streets and intersections as required by some of the new developments.

Other project updates

The **Library** expansion is continuing on schedule. The building will soon be enclosed and it is expected to open this winter.

Rush-Copley is continuing their work on the first phase of their medical campus as they go for final approval by the State Board and hope to break ground later this fall.

The developers of the proposed **Kendall Marketplace** at Cannonball Trail and Veterans Parkway are likewise hoping to get through their process and break ground this fall. The project includes widening a stretch of Veterans Parkway, improving a portion of Cannonball trail, and building the first leg of the Beecher Road extension.

The developers for the water park continue to work on their plans as the landowners proceed through the annexation process.

As for the former Countryside Center property, the owners have not yet secured users as required as part of a redevelopment agreement for them to receive TIF funding beyond what was allotted for demolition.

<u>Downtown TIF and downtown</u> <u>projects</u>

The downtown TIF is now in place and work on the first project at the corner of Hydraulic and Bridge Streets is in final review and is scheduled to begin in the very near future. The City staff has been contacted by other interested parties and, I suspect, we will see additional projects coming forward in the next few months. The rebuilding of the dam is continuing and IDNR has indicated that they are looking to continue the project including the building of the canoe chute. Finally, the City is converting the old post office into a new Parks and Recreation facility. It is important to note that these City projects are using funds from existing revenue sources and not from TIF funding.

Annexation of Route 71 properties

Finally, let me talk a bit about the recent annexation of the property to the southwest of the City along Rt. 71 west of West Highpoint Road. With its proximity to the connecting road to the proposed Eldamain Rd. bridge, and the proposed Prairie Parkway, this area has

been identified by our comprehensive plan for future business and manufacturing development.

This area also includes a parcel of land that has been proposed for a future solid waste landfill. Understand that this annexation does not guarantee the landfill will be sited at that particular location. Specific State Statute governs the siting process. The process is the same whether the application is made to the County or the City.

What this annexation has done, is to insure that the United City of Yorkville, which would be directly impacted should such a facility be sited, will have a say in determining whether it does or does not meet specific state requirements, as well as being able to add any additional conditions deemed necessary and reasonable.

Understand also, that if an application is submitted, the governing body and certain staff (in the case of the City this includes the Aldermen, the City attorney, and myself) may not speak on this issue to anyone including, the petitioner nor any citizen until the public hearings and the decision process is complete.



The Value of a Tree

Planting a tree is one of the simplest ways to improve a community's quality of life. Typically 10 percent of a City's "green" infrastructure is in parkway trees. The **United City of Yorkville** staff is currently updating the Landscape Ordinance to increase the variety of shade, ornamental and evergreen tree species acceptable for planting, provide guidelines for median landscaping, and strengthen preservation standards in order to find a balance between new growth and existing forests.

Much like Dutch Elm Disease changed the streetscape in the 1930's, the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has the capability to significantly alter the Illinois landscape. Ash trees, on average, account for six percent of forests state-wide and 20 percent of urban forests, totaling over 130 million ash trees in northeastern Illinois alone. Revisions to the City's Landscape Ordinance include a more diverse selection of plant material, including the addition of less disease and insect susceptible species and varieties. State and federal environmental agencies are working to eradicate the insect. You can prevent the EAB from coming to Yorkville by not transporting firewood from another state or infested county in Illinois.

Trees are valuable to homeowners by reducing energy consumption and increasing residential property value. In commercial areas, trees slow traffic and create a consumer-friendly environment. The current Landscape Ordinance strongly promotes preservation of existing trees in newly developing subdivisions and commercial centers. Revisions to the ordinance will raise the protection method standards to ensure the survival of protected trees.

Professionals in the fields of horticulture, forestry, and nursery stock growing have been consulted, in addition to published documentation on preservation standards and proven street tree species. City Council will be reviewing and considering the revisions in the coming weeks, so please be aware that the acceptable tree



list will be changing to promote a healthy green environment for Yorkville.

City Ordinance regarding dogs

The United City of Yorkville and the Yorkville Police Department would like to remind all residents that the city has an ordinance in place to help keep people and animals safe, our City clean and neighbors happy.

A portion of the ordinance reads as follows:

Dogs must be:

- •Confined by a fence of sufficient height and security (which may be an electronic invisible fence system) to prevent the animal from leaving the area so encompassed;
- •On a leash under the control of a responsible person;
- •On a leash securely fastened to an inanimate object and of a length which prevents it from leaving the property of its owner or keeper.
- •Any dog found upon a public street, sidewalk, alley or any uninclosed place, shall be deemed running at large unless the dogs is firmly held on a leash or is in an enclosed vehicle.
- •It shall be unlawful for any owner to allow a dog to defecate on private property, without permission of the property owners, or any public street, sidewalk or park without properly disposing of such waste in a trash receptacle.

The minimum utility bill for senior citizens for a two-month period is \$107.05.

Grande Reserve utility billing:

The Grande Reserve utility billing will be the same charges for water, sewer and refuse. Fox Metro will be the sanitary district for Grande Reserve and will be doing their own billing from reads provided to them from our meter reads. The rates are as follows: \$5.25 minimum for 350 cu. ft. usage then \$2 per 1,000 gallons (134 cu. ft.) For example 1,000 cu. ft. usage = \$15.

A minimum utility bill from the United City of Yorkville to Grande Reserve residents will be: \$40.84. (Note: This will not include Fox Metro Sanitary District charges as they will be billing for their services)

A minimum utility bill from the United City of Yorkville to seniors 65 and older is \$30.94. (This does not include Fox Metro Sanitary charges).

The Fox Metro Sanitary District billing for filling pools and watering sod which services Grande Reserve is as follows:

- •Fox Metro will adjust the bill if you have either filled a pool or watered new sod. This is not an automatic adjustment. For information you can call Fox Metro at 630.301.6881.
- •New accounts will be billed at approximately \$4.50 per person, per month (approximately \$24-\$26 per month).

For more information contact Fox Metro at 630.301.6881. Please note that the Yorkville Bristol Sanitary District does not discount for pool filling or watering. The flat fee of \$76.11 is for up to 6919 cu. ft. Any usage over 6919 will be billed at \$1.10 per cu.ft.

From the Water Department

The United City of Yorkville utility bills (water, sewer maintenance, Yorkville Bristol Sanitary District, garbage bills) are sent to every residential and business unit within the city limits on or about the first of the following months: January, March, May, July, September and November.

The water meter reads are taken at the beginning of each month and billed at the end of each month. For example, reads taken at the beginning of October will be billed on October 31 for August and September water usage. If you do not receive your bill, please call City Hall at 553-4350 to obtain the balance due and due date information that you will need in order to make your payment. Please keep in mind that if you move you will need to call for a final meter read due to the lag time in the meter reading/billing process.

Senior citizen rate

Senior Citizen Discount Rate: A qualified senior citizen (age 65 or older) bi-monthly refuse fee is \$1 for single family or duplex unit per utility billing cycle. Proof of age is required. For information, (630) 553-4350.

Utility billing e-pay

The Utility Billing Department is participating in an Internet payment service that is available to Yorkville residents. The E-Pay program was launched by State Treasurer Judy Baar Topinka's office. Payments can be made with a variety of credit cards including Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover and E-check. A user fee of \$3.50 per transaction is added to the payment amount for



the convenience of Internet service, however, this fee is not charged or collected by the city. You can visit the city Web site and follow the link, or call City Hall at (630) 553-4350 with any questions.

Direct debit available

Direct debit payment is available and it is auto-deducted from your checking or savings account on the day the bill is due. Applications are available at City Hall or on the City's Web site at www.yorkville.il.us. Completed forms can be dropped off or mailed to City Hall, 800 Game Farm Road, Yorkville, 60560.

Drop Box

For your convenience, there is a drop box located in front of City Hall by the entrance to the parking lot for making your utility bills payments after hours.

Snowbird Policy

Residents who are absent from their residence for a period of 60 consecutive days or more qualify for the Snowbird Utility Account Policy. The City of Yorkville utility charges for water, sewer, and refuse will be waived during the resident's absence. Any resident wishing to have their water shut off at the curb box during their vacancy will be charged a \$25 shut off fee which is to be paid prior to the shutoff order being issued. The YBSD charge of \$76.11 per unit will be reduced to \$45.55 which is the debt service loan portion of the bill. It is the resident's responsibility to inform the City of their return.

United City of Yorkville schedules refuse pick ups, hydrant flushing

Refuse pick-up

Weekly Waste Management Refuse pick-up is as follows:

Monday: South of the river, west of Rt. 47, Bristol Bay, Greenbriar, Prairie Gardens, Rivers Edge, Sunflower Estates, and White Oak Estates.

Tuesday: South of the river and east of Rt. 47, Cannonball Estates, Country Hills, Crooked Creek, Briarwood, Fox Highlands, Kylyn's, Raintree Village, Whispering Meadows, Wildwood and Windett Ridge.

Wednesday: Blackberry Creek, Grande Reserve, and Prairie Meadows Friday: North of the river, Cimmeron Ridge, Fox Hill, Countryside Center, Heartland, Longford Lakes.

Each residence covered under the city's agreement may put out one 64-gallon Waste Management refuse cart, one 35-gallon recycle cart and one large household item on the regular pick-up date.

Please have your garbage out by 6 a.m. Waste stickers are available for any extra items or additional refuse for \$1 at City Hall, Pride Pantry and Jewel. Extra recyclables do not require a sticker.

Yard waste pick-up happens from April 1 through November 29. There is no yard waste pick-up from November 30 through March 30. No stickers are required on yard waste, but it must be in brown kraft bags. When holidays fall on a regular refuse pick-up day, the pick-up will be made one day later. Holidays observed during 2006 by Waste Management are as follows: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Refuse, recycling and yard waste are collected by different trucks on different routes. However, if you home is missed, please call Waste Management at 800-796-9696. If you have any questions, please contact City Hall at (630) 553-4350.

Yard waste pick up

Yard waste is collected from April through November on scheduled garbage pick up days. Stickers are not required for yard waste but waste must be in brown kraft bags to be collected.

Brush and leaf pick up

The United City of Yorkville provides brush pick up from April through October. Brush must be placed parallel to the curb in neat stacks no longer than six feet in length and no wider than three inches in diameter. Brush must be placed on the parkway no later than 7 a.m., Monday morning. Brush crews will not return for special pick ups, once the street is completed, brush will not be picked up again until the next scheduled date for your area.

Hydrant Flushing

The city's Public Works Department schedules hydrant flushing in the months of April and October. If you experience rust in the water during this process, please let your water run clear and use caution when doing laundry on days that hydrant flushing is scheduled. In the event rust does occur, Rust Remover is available at local hardware stores.

White goods pick up

Yorkville white goods pick up is scheduled for the week of Oct. 16 - 20 on your regular pickup day only. Only one pass will be made. Please make sure items are out by 6:00 a.m. White goods pick up items include refrigerators, freezers, water heaters, air conditioners, humidifiers, stoves, boilers clothes dryers/washers, microwaves, dishwashers, heat pumps and furnaces.

Explanation of YBSD charges

The United City of Yorkville bills and collects the Yorkville-Bristol Sanitary District's (YBSD) "user charges" bi-monthly. This fee includes four services the people of Yorkville pay for. The four services are water, refuse pick-up, sewer maintenance and wastewater treatment.

To meet the stricter standards mandated by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) and to provide service to the area, the YBSD has borrowed \$9 million from the State of Illinois Revolving Loan Program. Loan monies pay for the expansion of the wastewater treatment plant located at 304 River St. The YBSD also has an existing debt incurred in 1991 of \$3.5 million. The dedicated source of revenue to pay these debts are part of the YBSD "user charge." The dedicated source of revenue format is a requirement of the IEPA to assure the low interest loan is paid back over a 20-year period.

The "user charges" are as follows: \$1.10 per 100 cubic feet of flow, providing that the user pay a minimum bi-monthly fee of \$76.11 of which \$45.55 is dedicated to Debt Service for the repayment of the IEPA Act Loan. The debit service fee is \$45.55 and \$30.56 is for operation and maintenance. The total is \$76.11.

Please note: If a customer uses 6,920 or more cubic feet of water, the fee would be calculated at \$1.10 per 100 cubic feet.

Public Works News

With the new water treatment plant fully operational please note that this will be the last time that the City newsletter will contain a radium update. The City is now in compliance with the standards for radium removal set forth by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Radium update

The United City of Yorkville Public Water System has levels of gross alpha and combined radium above drinking water standards.

Our water system has violated a drinking standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminant. Quarterly samples taken over the past year show that our system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL), for gross alpha and combined radium. The standard for gross alpha is 15 pico curies per liter (pCiL) and 5 pico curies of combined radium. The average level of gross alpha is 33 pico curies (pCiL) and combined radium over the past year was 19 pico curries per liter (pCiL).

Q. What should I do?

A. You do not need to use an alternative (e.g. bottled water) supply. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

Q. What does this mean?

A. This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately. However, some people who drink water containing radium-226 or radium-228 in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Q. What happened? What is being done?

A. The United City of Yorkville is currently designing and constructing Ion Exchange Treatment Facilities, which will remove the radium below the 5 pico curies per liter (pCi/L) level. We anticipate the treatment plant to be online by spring 2007. Please share this information with other people who drink


Public Works readies water facility for October service

The United City of Yorkville tested the city's water treatment plant for wells numbered 3 and 4 during the week of September 25. According to Public Works director Eric Dhuse, this is the last of three water treatment facilities that were designed to remove naturally occurring radium in the city's water.

With this new facility going into operation the City will now be in compliance with the final standards for radium removal set by the EPA. In fact this should be the last newsletter that contains the radium statement.

Dhuse expects the facility to be completely operational by mid October. Dhuse noted that once it is up and running, the entire city will be serviced with the same water. The third facility will service the central part of Yorkville from

Countryside to Colonial Parkway. During the initial change over, residents may notice a slightly different taste and odor but the effects will not last for an extended



As a result of the new facility, the city's water will benefit. The water will be softened to approximately eight grains of hardiness, down from the current level of 14-16 grains.

The city's other two facilities are located at 3299 Lehman Crossing in the Grande Reserve subdivision and at 2224 Tremont in the Raintree subdivision.

What should I do?

There is nothing you need to do at this time.

Guidelines to winterize your home

Use this pre-winter check list for a more economic heating season:

- •Be sure your home is well insulated.
- •Make sure ductwork is properly insulated and sealed.
- •Insulate your water heater using R-6 insulation or better.
- •Weather-strip around doors and windows.
- •Remove or cover window air conditioners.
- •Change the filters in your heating system.
- •Clear heating registers of items that may be blocking them including rugs and furniture.
- •Vacuum heating registers.
- •Reverse the direction of your ceiling fan blades. Fans should rotate counterclockwise in the winter.
- •Seal your fireplace damper when it is not in use; heat escapes up the chimney.

Moisture control 101

To prevent mold growth in your home, the U.S. Environmental Agency (EPA) says there are a few steps homeowners can take to control moisture in their homes.

- •Fix leaks and seepage. If water is entering the house from the outside, your options range from simple landscaping to extensive excavation and waterproofing (the ground should slope away from the house). Water in the basement can result from the lack of gutters or a water flow toward the house. Water leaks in pipes or around tubs and sinks can provide a place for biological pollutants to grow.
- •Cover dirt in a crawlspace with plastic covering to prevent moisture from coming in from the ground. Be sure crawl space are well ventilated.
- •Use exhaust fans in bathrooms and kitchens to remove moisture to the

outside (not into the attic). Point your clothes dryer vent to the outside.

- •Turn off certain appliances (such as humidifiers or kerosene heaters) if you notice moisture on windows and other surfaces.
- •Use dehumidifers and air conditioners in hot, humid climates to reduce moisture in the air, but be sure that the appliances do not become sources of biological pollutants.
- •Raise the temperature of cold surfaces where moisture condenses. Use insulation or storm windows. A storm window installed on the inside works better than one installed on the outside. Open doors between rooms especially doors to closets which may be colder than the rooms to increase circulation.

Change your clock; change your battery

You've seen the signs, heard the slogan, and reminded yourself that you really should find a few minutes to test your home smoke detectors. How many of us will actually change the batteries and test our smoke detectors when we set our clocks back on Sunday, October 29?

The majority of home fires that kill people happen at night. If you're asleep the smell of smoke won't always wake you up. In fact, smoke and poisonous gasses can put you into a deeper sleep.

Inexpensive home smoke alarms can wake you up in time to escape—cutting your chances of dying nearly in half. Smoke alarms do save lives, and in most states, including Illinois, are required by law in private homes.

How to choose a smoke detector.

Be sure that the smoke alarm you buy carries the label of an independent testing lab such as UL. Some home smoke alarms run only on batteries, others on household current and batteries. There are different sensor technologies, some faster to react when fires are smoldering, others faster when fires are openly flaming. All are fast enough to provide sufficient warning. All laboratory tested smoke alarms, regardless of type, will protect you if they're installed and maintained properly.

How many do you need?

Install at least one smoke detector on every floor of your home, including the basement and outside each sleeping area. Smoke alarms should also be installed in every bedroom. Yorkville's building code now requires detectors inside every bedroom of new homes as well as on every level and near all sleeping areas. Be sure everybody sleeping in your home can hear the alarms. Smoke detectors should be installed in kitchens, bathrooms or garages where cooking fumes, steam or exhaust might set off false alarms. Do not install smoke detectors in attics or unheated spaces.

Where to install.

Smoke rises, so mount alarms high on a wall or on the ceiling. Wall mounted alarms should be mounted with the top of the device four to 12 inches down from the ceiling. Mount ceiling devices at least four inches away from any wall. In a room with a pitched ceiling, mount the alarm at or near the ceiling's highest point. Always position smoke detectors in closed stairs at the ceiling near the bottom of the stair as dead air trapped at the top of the stair may prevent the detector from activating.

How do I know I need new batteries?

A "chirping" smoke alarm is indicating that it has a low battery. Test your alarms monthly by pushing the "test button". If you change batteries and your detector still doesn't test OK it is time to buy a new detector. It is now recommended that smoke detectors be replaced at least every 10 years.

When the smoke detector activates? If a detector activates, leave the premises immediately and call 911. Teach children to recognize the sound of the

smoke detector and what to do if it activates.
