

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

WIND ENERGY TOPIC AT REGIONAL PLANNING CONSORTIUM MEETING

Thirty-two attendees gathered valuable information on wind energy systems at the March 18 **Kendall County Planning Consortium** hosted by the city of Joliet.



The evening's guest speaker,
Jim Griffin,
a member of
the Illinois
Wind Working
Group,
explained that
wind turbines
can be used for
urban or single
turbine uses.
A benefit of
wind turbines,
according to

Griffin, is that they can generate property taxes without the need to offer a lot of services.

The United City of Yorkville is currently preparing a wind turbine ordinance which will include provisions for the following: Zoning districts, road usage agreements (vehicle weights for transportation of turbine pieces) and decommissioning, or tear-down of turbines no longer being used.

Cities can include provisions in their ordinances to help protect residents and neighboring municipalities from air stream

interference and noise. The Illinois Pollution Control Board is the best regulator of noise complaints.

Generally, individual manufacturers of turbines are not mandated by a city. In addition, wind farms may be a deterrent to development because the units may appear to be unsightly to residents in the community. A turbine permit fee would be determined by the Department of Building, Zoning and Safety.

To date there has been no reported problems with ice formation on turbines, or injury by breakage of a turbine to the ground.

Yorkville's Plan Commission chairman, **Anne Lucietto,** and the Community Development Department host the consortium meetings bi-monthly. City and county elected officials, plan commission and staff members, and interested citizens of Yorkville, and 14 surrounding communities are invited to attend.

The **Village of Minooka** will be hosting the May consortium meeting. We are currently looking for speakers and topics for future meetings. Please call the Community Development Department at 630.553.8532 with suggestions.

BRIEF REMINDERS...

•Conservation Ordinance

The United City of Yorkville **Water Conservation Ordinance** is effective May 1 through September 30. The permitted hours of water usage are as follows:

Even/odd (even numbered street addresses/even calendar dates; odd numbered street addresses/odd numbered calendar dates) permitted watering hours are as follows:

Between the hours of 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. and between the hours of 9 p.m. to 12 a.m. (midnight) each day

• Mailbox Replacement Policy

Only mailboxes that are struck



directly by a city vehicle or piece of equipment will be eligible for replacement. Damage caused by snow will not be eligible for

replacement. Below are a list of procedures to follow if your mailbox is damaged by a City vehicle.

- •You must notify the **Public Works Department** within three days of the occurrence. A temporary mailbox will be installed until a determination can be made as to whether the City is responsible.
- •A Public Works representative will inspect your mailbox and determine if it was properly installed, the material was in good condition, and if it was struck by a City vehicle.
- •If determined that the City was responsible, the homeowner is eligible for reimbursement of up to \$75 to replace the mailbox.
- •Reimbursement may be submitted to the City after the homeowner installs a new mailbox and it is inspected by a Public Works representative.
- •The homeowner is responsible for the replacement of the mailbox in all instances when the City was not at fault. To report an incident call Public Works at 630.553.4370.

GO GREEN-PLANT A TREE

New cost-effective program makes it easy



The United City of Yorkville's new 50/50
Parkway Tree program allows residents to choose right-of-way trees for city streets and corridors for a fraction of the cost. This cost-share program allows the City to give residents a great price for the purchase of the tree. The City's share of the program is to plant, mulch and water the tree. The city will only water the tree when it is planted.

The trees, according to **Laura Haake**, the City's park designer, are purchased by the City at wholesale prices. "It's a great price, and we are able to pass that price along to the homeowner," says Haake.

Residents can choose from several different species such as the Callery Pear, Catalpa, Elm, Gingko, Common Hackberry, Kentucky Coffeetree, Linden, Oak, Red and Sugar Maple, Thornless Honeylocust and Turkish Filbert. And the selection doesn't end there. Each species offers several different varieties. Prices range from \$108 to \$197. The caliper of each tree is a minimum of 2.5 inches in diameter. No guarantee of viability will be provided.

This year a total of 36 trees are available for purchase. Trees purchased this year, with the exception of Oak trees, will be planted in the fall. Residents who purchase Oaks can expect the trees to be planted in the spring of 2010.

Trees purchased through the program are required to be planted within the area of the right-of-way in front of or on the sides of a homeowner's property.

According to Haake the available right-of-way area varies and depends on the platting of the property and the width of the right-of-way. Generally, that area is eight to 10 feet from the edge of the curb.

The City will work with the homeowner to locate the tree. Exact placement is essential.

"Trees must be located a minimum distance of 50 feet from any other tree in the parkway and not conflict with existing utilities," explains Haake.

In addition, the trees must be located at least 20 feet from an overhead light or fire hydrant and 30 feet from any intersection.

NEW! E-Waste Recycling

Yorkville's Public Works facility now accepts recycled electronics through a new agreement with Com2 Computers and Technologies LLC. Under the agreement, Yorkville residents will be able to dispose of electronic products and materials by dropping off items in the plastic box located at the city's Public Works facility, 610 Tower Lane, Yorkville.

Acceptable items:

Items accepted at no additional charge to residents include the following: Calculators, cell phones, portable music players, mp3 players, CD and tape players, radios, boom boxes, speakers, computer laptops, computer notebooks, desktop computers, printers, copiers, VCRs, DVD players, telephones, microwaves, and other standard household electronic devices.

Items that require a service charge:

A fee of \$5 will be charged for CRT monitors and terminals. Residents dropping off televisions will be charged a rate of \$1 per diagonal inch of TV screen, up to a maximum of \$50.

Facility hours and payment guidelines:

For all items that do not require a service charge, residents may simply drop off the materials at the Public Works facility during the hours of 7 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. For items that require a service charge, residents must first pay the fee at City Hall, 800 Game Farm Road, during the hours of 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Residents will receive a paid receipt that must accompany the item prior to drop off at the Public Works facility. Call the city's Public Works Dept. at 630.553.4370 for more information.

News From Our Departments

From the Department of Building, Safety and Zoning

Are you planning a home improvement project this summer? If you answered YES, don't forget the first step in any home improvement project—permits. Before you begin, call the City's Department of Building, Safety and Zoning and check on the permits that are needed. Obtaining the appropriate permits are important for many reasons. Work completed under the proper permits and inspections provides reasonable assurance that the work has been performed safely and accurately.

Why are permits needed?

- •It's the law. City Building Code requires that permits be obtained for certain types of work.
- •Permits protect you, your family, home, businesses and financial investment.
- •Permits are deigned to help ensure that licensed contractors do the work, if required.
- •Permitted work requires inspection approval from a certified inspector.
- •Inspections ensure that work is done safely and meets the minimum code requirements. Incorrect installations

can result in home fires, flood damage and/or structural problems.

- •Minor problems that could lead to costly repairs, liability and life/safety issues can also be detected during permit inspections and brought to your attention before the situation worsens.
- •When selling a property or home, the buyer, realtor and lender may require that un-permitted work be corrected, properly permitted and inspected before closing. This leaves you in the position of scrambling to get your work legal.

Who can do the work?

As the owner of a single-family home, you may hire a building, electrical, plumbing or mechanical contractor to do the work or in most cases, you can do it yourself. This means that you, the owner, will be responsible for doing the work. Permit requirements for you doing your own work are the same as those for a contractor doing the work. You must, however, be the owner and occupant of the house if you

NEW! RECYCLED ELECTRONICS PROGRAM BENEFITS YOUTH AND SENIORS IN KENDALL COUNTY



The **Kendall County Youth Service Board** and the **Kendall County Triad** is accepting used cell phones,
PDA's, laptops, and digital cameras for recycling.

Proceeds from the collection of these electronics will be used to assist in promoting and enhancing community based youth programs.

Seniors will also benefit. Program organizers will provide the recycled cell phones to seniors for emergency uses that they might otherwise not be able to afford on a fixed income.

•Senior Well-Being Check

Do you know an elderly person that lives alone?

The **Senior Well-Being Check** program, managed by the **Kendall County Triad,** a group of individuals and businesses in Kendall County, has implemented a free system to check up on seniors living alone. The device uses a voice over system instead of a computer generated voice to call seniors on a daily basis. The date and time of each call is recorded. When the call is made, seniors respond that everything is well by pressing the number one. If they do not pick up, the program generates a phone call to the next person on the senior's application. If that person picks up the Well-Being Check is complete. This program can contact up to four other numbers the applicant submits. The Well-Being Check is free to the user and can be

FROM ALDERWOMAN ROSE SPEARS, WARD FOUR

For the past 12 years, informative, open, and direct communication with constituents has been my top priority. As a result, three years ago I created an electronic contact list to inform residents of pertinent City business and events. My list initially began with Ward 4 residents; however, many residents throughout the City (as well as non-residents) requested to be included on the electronic mailings. I am pleased with the success of this communication tool. If you would like to be included on this electronic list, please contact me at RoseA00@aol.com.

In February I suggested the City adopt an ordinance to ensure when passing an item out of committee, that may have a major impact on residents and/or surrounding neighbors, the item should first be listed on the City Council agenda under the committee report section as being a first reading. This would give notice to the public that a substantial change is being contemplated and the City Council will be taking input and considering the item at the next scheduled council meeting. This notice of reading would allow the public two weeks to prepare for a public forum as well as encourage the public to provide input to assist the Council in the decision making process. On March 24, 2009 the City Council approved the first reading (allowing a public forum to be conducted) to be an amendment to the Governing Ordinance.

In order to assure an honest transparent local government, in December 2008, I proposed that the City pass a resolution adopting the provisions of the Illinois Whistleblower Reward and Protection Act. Governor Quinn first proposed the Illinois Whistleblower Reward and Protection Act in 1991, when he served as state treasurer. As initially passed, the Act protected Illinois taxpayers and state employees from official retribution when they blew the whistle on fraud and corruption in state government.

The law also entitles the state to collect up to three times the amount lost to fraud, along with fines up to \$10,000, and provides for the whistleblower to receive up to 30 percent of the amount recovered. The Act has been amended to included electors of any school district, public community college district, municipality, municipal corporation or unit of local government. Any of these entities may pass, by initiative petition and referendum a binding ordinance adopting the provisions of the act. I would encourage any individual of the opinion a violation of a law or regulation exists with any local electors, and you have evidence to go to www.whistleblower.org for additional information.

Seasonal Public Safety Issues:

I would like to remind residents to place raked leaves and tree branches on their parkways. Placing the leaves/branches in the street is a City code violation and creates a dangerous public safety issue.

As a reminder, the City has adopted a **Fireworks Code of Ordinance (S-31-11)** that has been adopted for the safety of our citizens. Please view the ordinance on the City's Web site.

The **Regulation of Animals City Ordinance** requires restraint of an animal (confined by a fence of sufficient height and security which may be an electronic invisible fence system) to prevent it from leaving the encompassed area, on a leash under the control of a responsible person, or on a leash securely fastened to an inanimate object and length which prevents it from leaving the property of its owner or keeper.

The Solicitors, Hawkers and Itinerant Merchants City Code (Chapter 7) requires solicitors, hawkers and itinerant merchants to complete an application for certificate, submit a photo as well as fingerprinting for registration with the Police Department. Upon approval, a photo ID is issued and required to be clearly displayed while soliciting. Soliciting is not permitted before 9 a.m. or after 8 p.m. Monday through Friday; or, prior to 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. on Saturday. Soliciting is not permitted on Sundays or state and national holidays. Contact the Police Department immediately if a solicitor is in violation of City Code-Chapter 7.
