## Yorkville Citizens Police Academy Class

These will include the State's Attornev's Office, Probation and Kendall County Corrections. We will discuss other aspects of law enforcement such as the Special Response Team (SRT) and Cooperative Police Assistance Team (CPAT). Some of our officers will be giving demonstrations on self defense and the proper techniques of making traffic stops.

### **Child Safety Seat Installation**

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reminds us:

"The instructions that come with your child's safety seat and in your vehicle's owner's manual show you how to install your child's safety seat correctly. Once the seat is installed, check it by firmly pulling at the base of the child seat, at the safety belt path, from side to side and forward. The seat should not move more than one inch in any direction."
