Purpose: This Domestic Violence Protocol defines the role Law Enforcement Officers play in securing safety for victims and preventing further abuse. It describes the law and guides Officers in enforcement and victim assistance.

Policy: It is the Policy of the Yorkville Police Department that Officers treat all acts of Domestic Violence as criminal acts. Domestic Violence incidents shall be treated in the same manner as all other requests for police assistance in cases where there has been physical violence, other forms of violence or the threat thereof.

It is the policy of this Department that Officers utilize the arrest powers granted by the State Legislature when there is probable cause to do so.

It is the policy of this Department that Officers provide immediate effective assistance and protection to victims of Domestic Violence and to take appropriate action against offenders.

II. Response Procedures

A. Telecommunications

- 1. Telecommunications will give a Domestic Violence call the same priority as any other life-threatening call and it is recommended that they, whenever possible, dispatch at least two (2) Officers to the scene. The decision as to the priority of the call should be based on the seriousness of the injuries or threatened harm, and whether the assailant is present.
- 2. Telecommunications will obtain minimal information, including:
 - a. Caller's identity
 - b. Exact location
 - c. Injury
 - d. Weapons description
 - e Identity of victim and suspect
 - f. Whether suspect is present
 - g. Relationship between victim and suspect

Telecommunicators shall make every effort to keep the victim/witness on the phone until Officers arrive.

- 3. In addition to the above information, the telecommunicator shall ask:
 - a. Is the suspect under the influence of alcohol or drugs?
 - b. Are children present?
 - c. Have the Police been called because of this suspect before?
 - d. If so, how many times?
 - e. Is there a valid order of protection on file?
 - f. Prior contacts at that address?
 - g. Is there a history of mental illness?
- 4. If the caller is a child, advise responding Officers.

- 5. The telecommunicator will relay any information gathered from the caller that may be helpful to the Officer(s) in assessing the situation.
- 6. Telecommunicators should make periodic checks on Officer(s) at the scene.
- 7. The safety of Domestic Violence victims should be the primary concern of the call taker. Victims should be advised of strategies to ensure their safety in any way possible.
- 8. If a second call is received requesting cancellation of the original call, Officers shall be instructed to continue their response to insure the safety of all parties.
- 9. Document the call as required by departmental procedure.
- 10. Once the officer is on the scene, telecommunicator will research history of suspect.
- B. Officers: Officers will respond to Domestic Violence calls promptly. All such calls should be regarded as potentially "high risk" situations and back-up units should be used when available.

An order of protection/warrant check shall be made on the suspect through LEADS.

Officer(s) should advise their status as soon as possible after arrival and keep in contact with the telecommunicator.

III. Officer / Investigator Responsibilities at the Scene

Officers responding to Domestic Violence calls should understand that the most dangerous time for them is their arrival. Officers should respond, park and approach these calls tactically and should not stand in front of the entry door.

A Domestic Violence incident may be a victim's first contact with Law Enforcement. Therefore, this initial contact is very important, and may affect the cooperation between the victim and investigators.

The Illinois Domestic Violence Act (IDVA) of 1986 requires Officers to assist the victim and report the incident. It allows for the arrest of the abuser where probable cause exists.

- A. <u>Initial Response</u>: When an Officer arrives at a Domestic Violence call, the Officer shall:
 - 1. Control the scene, being watchful for the presence of weapons. Secure any weapon that may be a threat to anyone present.
 - 2. Summon ambulance if injuries require.
 - a. Document names and unit #'s of responding treating personnel and fire and incident report numbers.
 - 3. Separate victim, suspect, and witnesses. Prevent communication among the parties. This includes removing victim and witnesses from suspect's line of sight and range of hearing.

- 4. Interview child witnesses in a comfortable place away from others, if practical. You should interview the children even if they were in another room at the time of the incident.
 - a. Be at eye level.
 - b. Befriend the child and explain your presence.
 - c. Be alert for signs of child abuse and whether the child is fearful of any of the persons involved.
 - d. Interview the child outside of the presence of the offender.
- 5. Note and document the following:
 - a. Location of involved subjects upon officer's arrival;
 - b. Physical condition of involved subjects, including any injuries;
 - c. Emotional condition of victim/suspect;
 - d. Spontaneous statements, "excited utterances," made by any person(s) involved.
 - e. Taking written and oral statements of victim, offender, witnesses
 - f. Where available, take recorded statements with victim and witnesses documented permission.
 - g. Photographs of injuries to victim and offender, including any property damage associated with the investigation. See Section IV for more detail on evidence collection.
- 6. Prepare a written report, whether or not an arrest is made, the report shall include, but not be limited to:
 - a. Disposition of the allegation.
 - b. Victim statement as to the frequency and severity of prior incidents by the same family member.
 - c. The number of prior requests for police assistance.
 - d. If an arrest is not made, the Officer shall document the reason for that decision in the report.
 - e. The report shall be prepared using standardized report forms as provided in existing departmental procedures.
- 7. Take enforcement action based upon the investigative findings.
- 8. If the suspect has left the scene, the Officer should attempt to locate him/her.
- 9. If the offender is a juvenile, refer to Court Services in accordance with existing referral procedures and the Juvenile Court Act.
- 10. If victim is under the age of 18, refer to Child Advocacy Center protocol.
- B. <u>Assistance to the Victim:</u> If the Officer finds a person has been abused by a family or household member, the Officer will take all reasonable steps to prevent further abuse, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Accompanying the victim into his/her residence to remove necessary personal items:
 - 2. Informing the victim in his/her primary language, when possible, of his/her rights under the Illinois Domestic Violence Act of 1986; and providing the victim with the name and badge number of the investigating Officer and the arresting agency's phone number (Attachment C). In addition, provide the victim with a written

statement and explanation of the rights of crime victims (Attachment F) within 48 hours of initial contact with the victim.

- 3. Providing the victim with the name and phone number of the local Domestic Violence Shelter (**Attachment C**) and:
 - a. If the victim is 60 years of age or older, a referral to a network of services for seniors.
 - b. If the victim is hearing-impaired, a referral to a sign language interpreter.
 - c. If the victim cannot communicate in English, a referral to a community program with translation services.
 - d. If the victim is a high-risk adult with disabilities, a referral to an agency that provides services for persons with disabilities.
- 4. Advising the victim to seek medical attention medical care may be necessary even though injuries are not immediately visible.
- 5. Advising the victim of evidence collected by the Officer, and of the importance of preserving evidence, the types of evidence that could be collected at a later time, and how they can be used and by whom.
- 6. Transporting or arranging for the transportation of the victim to a medical facility for the treatment of injuries, or to a Domestic Violence shelter or a place of safety, in accordance with existing departmental procedures. Every effort should be made to obtain a release for medical records from the victim in the event the victim is transported to a medical facility.
- 7. Seizing weapons used, asking and documenting if a weapon was used in the past so the victim can seek a court order requiring the weapon's seizure.
- 8. Allowing minors or dependents of the victim to remain with the victim or person designated by the victim, rather than remain with the abusing party.
- 9. Make arrangements to meet the victim for a follow-up, when appropriate to take additional photos.
- C. Assistance to Children: Officers should be aware that Domestic Violence situations are traumatic to children and the Officer is often the only respondent who will assist the child. Officers should acknowledge the history of violence in the household and the child's experiences, listen to the child and offer comfort. If minor children are present and if the Officer, as a mandated reporter, reasonably believes they have been abused or neglected, the incident shall be reported to the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (1-800-25-ABUSE). A minor's mere presence in a domestic violence home can be the basis of a neglect petition for injurious environment without the officer having to determine if the minor witnessed the incident or whether the child was actually affected by that incident. If the Officer, as a mandated reporter, reasonably believes that the child or children have been the victim(s) of sexual or severe physical abuse, the Officer may, in addition to reporting the incident to Kendall County SAO (630-553-4157), take the minor child or children into protective custody to prevent further abuse.

D. <u>Elder Abuse:</u> If the Officer, as a mandated reporter, has reason to suspect that a family or household member aged 60 or older is abused, neglected or exploited, the Officer shall make a report to the Illinois Department on Aging, Elder Abuse and Neglect Program either by calling 1-800-252-8966 or by calling the local designated elder abuse provider agency, Senior Services Associates, Inc. at 800-942-1724. If an arrest is not made, the Officer should clearly document circumstances of the incident in the report.

IV. Evidence Collection

The evidence collected at the crime scene may determine the charges brought by the State's Attorney or otherwise influence the prosecution of a case. This section reviews the steps the responding Officer should take when handling a Domestic Violence call.

- A. The Officer should process the crime scene and collect evidence as in any other case involving physical harm to a victim. It is recommended that evidence collection should include color photographs of the premises that corroborate the purported incident and any weapons of other articles that can be used to corroborate the occurrence of violence. These items may include but are not limited to:
 - 1. Broken glass
 - 2. Torn clothing
 - 3. Blood-stained items
 - 4. Damaged items
 - 5. Recent or fresh bruising, abrasions and lacerations
 - 6. Defensive injuries
 - 7. Phones disabled
 - 8. Weapons
- B. Photos taken should also include:
 - 1. Full body photos to establish identity of the victim and location of injuries.
 - 2. Full body photos of the defendant including any alleged injuries and/or lack of injuries.
 - 3. Close-ups of injuries.
 - 4. Photos of injuries hidden by clothing (the services of a same gender Officer should be enlisted to photograph such injuries in private)
- C. When available, take recorded statement with victim and witnesses documented permission.
- D. Collect related weapons and other evidence, including all instrumentalities of the crime. This evidence may include items of crimes other than Domestic Violence.
- E. An audiotape of the 911 call, complaint or call for assistance should be obtained if of evidential value.
- F. Computer or any computer-related material, including social media, email and cell phone/text message data should be collected when appropriate.
- G. If the Officer has not determined whether an order of protection has been issued, he or she shall verify the existence of an order of protection either by telephone or radio communications with the Law Enforcement agency or by referring to the copy of such order provided by the victim or other individuals present.

- H. EMT's and hospital personnel should be encouraged to document in their reports, statements made by the victim as to how injuries occurred and the history of the abuse.
- I. Strangulation cases Officers should note any injuries seen involving allegations of strangulation including red marks or scratches. Officers should be aware that bruising may not develop right away. If possible, officers should attempt to visit with the victim three days after the incident to detect any bruising from the strangulation. Officers should also document any and all pain felt by the victim of strangulation including but not limited to dry, scratchy throat and pain when swallowing.

V. Arrest

The Officer shall handle Domestic Violence as he or she would any other crime, including considering all the grounds for arrest, not just offenses most commonly associated with Domestic Violence. This section describes when an arrest is made with and without a warrant.

NOTE: The investigating Officer should sign the complaint(s) if the victim is unable or unwilling to do so.

- A. In cases involving Domestic Violence, an Officer may make an arrest without a warrant when probable cause exists. If any of the following circumstances exists, the Officers shall make an arrest, given probable cause AND:
 - 1. If the victim has visible injuries.
 - 2. When a felony has been committed.
 - 3. When any weapon has been used to inflict injury or to intimidate or threaten the victim.
 - 4. When an offense is committed in the presence of the Officer
 - 5. When an Officer has confirmed that a valid order of protection is in effect, the offender has been served or has knowledge of the order, and the offender has violated a police enforceable condition of the order.

NOTE: If the offender denies knowledge of the order of protection and his/her denial is credible, the Officer shall provide the offender with a copy of the order of protection on a short form notification and orally advise the offender of the contents, and document in the report that a copy of the order and short form was served and the contents of the order of protection were explained to the offender. The Officer should then notify LEADS that the OOP has been served through the form process.

- 6. When an officer has determined a person charged with a criminal offense against a family or household member has violated the automatic 72-hour no-contact provision of a bond following release. The offender may be charged with violation of bail bond (5/32-10).
- 7. When the offender is on parole.
- 8. If the offender is a juvenile refer to the Juvenile Court Act.
- B. No Officer shall decline to arrest an offender because:
 - 1. The parties live together.
 - 2. The parties have sought civil remedies.
 - 3. The victim has been previously unwilling to participate in the complaint or arrest process.
 - 4. Verbal assurances are given that the violence will cease.
 - 5. The parties are of the same gender.

- 6. Either or both the parties are under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.
- 7. The victim gave the offender access to the home.
- C. If another crime has been committed during the violation of the order of protection, that crime should also be charged as an additional felony or misdemeanor complaint and documented in your report.
- D. If an arrest is not made, the victim should be advised a criminal complaint need not be signed at the time of the incident and to contact the appropriate SAO for further action. Also, if an officer decides not to make an arrest, the officer should still document his/her contact with all of the individuals in a police report. This police report number should be given to the victim to bring to the appropriate SAO to pursue charges.
- E. If a Law Enforcement Officer receives complaints of Domestic Violence from two or more opposing persons, the Officer shall evaluate each complaint separately to determine the aggressor. In determining who is the aggressor, the Officer shall consider:
 - 1. Prior complaints of Domestic Violence,
 - 2. The severity of the injuries inflicted on each person,
 - 3. If one of the persons acted in self-defense and defensive injuries observed,
 - 4. Use of any weapon to inflict injury or to intimidate or threaten the victim,
 - 5. The fearfulness and excited utterances of each person, and
 - 6. Statements from witnesses.

After the aggressor is determined, make the appropriate arrest.

F. Additional Investigative Procedures

- 1. Additional photos should be taken 2-5 days following the incident when appropriate, since some bruising may take some time to develop.
- 2. Additional questions should be asked of the victim by assigned Officers. These questions may include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Is there a history of physical, sexual or mental abuse?
 - b. Has the suspect threatened to kill the victim?
 - c. Is the victim trying to separate from the suspect?
 - d. Have there been prior calls to the police?
 - e. Is there drug or alcohol abuse by the suspect?
 - f. Does the suspect have access to weapons?
 - g. What is the prior criminal history of the suspect?
 - h. Has the suspect abused or threatened to abuse animals or pets?
 - i. Has the suspect demonstrated hostile behavior to police or others?
 - j. Has there been an increase in the frequency or severity of the abuse?
 - k. Has the suspect been violent toward children?
 - 1. Does the suspect have any pending court actions?

VI. Complaint Writing

Complaints shall be written as follows:

Count (1): 720 ILCS 5/12-3.2(a)(2)

On or about (date of offense) defendant (name of defendant) knowingly made contact of an insulting or provoking nature with (victim's name), a family or household member of the defendant, in that he/she (describe in a general nature – keep away from specifics).

The Officer should also charge a second count if bodily harm occurs.

Count (2): 720 ILCS 5/12-3.2(a)(1)

On or about (date of offense) defendant (name of defendant) knowingly caused bodily harm to (victim's name), a family or household member of the defendant, in that she/he (for example: struck him/her about the body or other such general language that describes the act).

NOTE: Do not put the separate acts into one paragraph. There must be only one count per complaint.

VII. Investigating Stalking, Harassment or Violation of Order of Protection Cases

- A. Recognizing the Stalking Case: Any time a victim reports any type of harassing behavior, the responding Officer should consider the possibility of stalking. Additional inquiries must be made to determine whether this is an isolated incident or repeated conduct.
- B. <u>Assessing the Stalker:</u> It is vital that the investigator learn as much as possible about the suspect and his/her method of operation. The Officer must assess the potential threat posed by a suspect. Information that should be documented includes:
 - 1. Any prior threats made.
 - 2. Any actual pursuit or following of the victim.
 - 3. Any history of violence against the victim or others.
 - 4. Any information regarding the suspect's tendency towards emotional outbursts or rage.
 - 5. Substance abuse problems.
 - 6. Possession or knowledge of or fascination with weapons.
 - 7. Any history of order of protection violations.
 - 8. Suspect's prior criminal history and/or prior contacts with Law Enforcement.
 - 9. Inquire about computer activity/behavior including but not limited to emails, social media, as well as cell phone/text message data.
 - 10. Determine the emotional demeanor of the victim and document what is seen as well as if she/he is seeing a professional due to the defendant's conduct.

C. <u>Gathering evidence of the stalking conduct:</u>

- 1. Lawfully obtain any tangible items of evidence from the offender.
 - a. Photos, diagrams, or drawings of the victim's home or workplace.
 - b. Writings, logs, or diaries kept by the suspect that describe stalking activities, thoughts or fantasies about the victim(s).
 - c. Personal items belonging to the victim.

- d. Video or audiotapes that might have information concerning the stalking, such as surveillance footage.
- e. Books describing stalking techniques or having subject matter dealing with stalking, harassment or violence.
- f. Any equipment that appears to have been used to stalk the victim such as cameras, binoculars and video recorders.
- g. Computer or any computer related material, such as emails and social media data when appropriate.
- 2. Obtain any tangible items of evidence from the victim that substantiates the stalking behavior:
 - a. Any taped phone messages.
 - b. Any letters, notes written by the suspect to the victim.
 - c. Any objects sent to or left for the victim.
 - d. Any "Caller ID" telephone records, including cell phone and text message data and records.
 - e. Any pertinent computer information or activity, such as emails and social media data.
- 3. Obtain any corroborative evidence:
 - a. Photograph any items vandalized, damaged, written on, etc.
 - b. Check for fingerprints on any vandalized items or other items or objects sent to or left for the victim.
 - c. Advise the victim to put a trap on her/his phone.
 - d. Obtain phone records and/or cell phones from the victim and suspect residences.
 - e. Have the victim obtain a telephone answering machine or voice mail.
 - f. For any incident of harassment, determine whether witnesses were present and interview them.
 - g. Research suspect's whereabouts during times of alleged acts to deter "alibi" defenses.
 - h. Consider surveillance in serious cases.

VIII. Domestic Violence Sexual Assault

See Sexual Assault Procedures and Protocol. All other IDVA procedures and protocol still apply.

IX. Orders of Protection

***NOTE: Full Faith and Credit: Valid Orders of Protection must be enforced to protect victims of Domestic Violence wherever a violation of an order occurs, regardless of where the order was issued.

- A. <u>Description</u>: An Order of Protection is a statutory remedy which is designed to give "family or household members relief under statutory provisions 725 ILCS 5/112A, et seq., and 750 ILCS 60/101 et seq. Violations of an Order of Protection may be enforceable with or without civil or criminal contempt of court proceedings in criminal court.
- B. <u>Availability</u>: An Order of Protection may be issued independently in a civil action, as part of a divorce proceeding or in conjunction with a criminal action or delinquency action.

- C. <u>Duty of Law Enforcement Officer</u>: It is the duty of Law Enforcement Officer to take all reasonable steps to prevent further abuse. Action shall include, but not be limited to, advising the victim(s) of the availability of an Order of Protection or enforcement of a valid Order of Protection.
- D. <u>Remedies</u>: The remedies available to a petitioner in an Order of Protection, any or all of which may be granted by the court, include:
 - 1. Prohibition of abuse, neglect, or exploitation. ◆
 - 2. Grant of exclusive possession of the residence.
 - 3. Ordering respondent to stay away from the petitioner or prohibiting respondent from entering or remaining present at petitioner's school, place of employment, or other specified places or times when petitioner is present. ◆
 - 4. Counseling. *
 - 5. Physical care and possession of the minor child.
 - 6. Temporary legal custody. *
 - 7. Determination of visitation with a minor child. *
 - 8. Prohibiting respondent from removing a minor child from the State or concealing the child within the State.
 - 9. Ordering the respondent to appear in court to prevent abuse, neglect, removal or concealment of a minor child, to return the child to the petitioner or to permit any court ordered interview or examination.
 - 10. Granting petitioner exclusive possession of personal property.
 - 11. Forbidding respondent from taking, transferring, encumbering, damaging, concealing or otherwise disposing of real or personal property.
 - 12. Ordering respondent to pay support for petitioner or any child in petitioner's custody. *
 - 13. Ordering respondent to pay petitioner for losses suffered as a direct result of the abuse, neglect, or exploitation. *
 - 14. Prohibiting the respondent from entering or remaining in the residence or household while the respondent is under the influence of alcohol or drugs and which constitutes a threat to the safety and wellbeing of the petitioner or the petitioner's children.
 - 15. If it is alleged in the Order of Protection that there has been a threat or likely use of a firearm, and the court is satisfied that there is any danger of use of a firearm, the court shall issue an order/warrant for seizure of such firearms(s) for safe keeping for up to two (2) years or until Order of Protection expires; if defendant is a Police Officer, the court shall order his/her service firearm to be surrendered to his/her agency's chief. ◆
 - 16. Under certain circumstances, denying respondent access to, and prohibiting respondent from inspecting, obtaining, or attempting to inspect or obtain school or any other records of the minor child who is in the care of petitioner.
 - 17. Ordering respondent to pay for shelter services. *
 - 18. Entering such injunctive relief as may be necessary or appropriate to prevent further abuse.

◆ Police Enforceable Condition

* Not available as part of an Emergency Order of Protection

Officers should be aware that violations of any remedy not specifically designated as police enforceable may constitute a crime under other criminal statutes.

- E. Services of Process
 - 1. Summons. Any action for an Order of Protection is a distinct cause of action and requires that a separate summons be issued and served.
 - 2. Expedited Service: The summons shall be served by the Sheriff, other Law Enforcement Officer, or a specially appointed process server, at the earliest time and shall take precedence over other summons except those of a similar emergency nature.
 - 3. NOTE: It is not necessary that the respondent be formally served with an order of protection. Only knowledge of the order's content is necessary.

F. Order of Protection "Short Form Notification"

- 1. The Order of Protection "Short Form Notification" (Attachment **D**) shall be used to effectuate service of Orders of Protection upon respondents encountered during traffic stops or other routine contact with state or local law enforcement officers. The Short Form Notification form is a carbonless, four part form required pursuant to 725 ILCS 5/112A-22.10.
- 2. A LEADS inquiry will identify those individuals whom an Order of Protection has been issued, however, have *not yet been served*. Officers coming into contact with these individuals, "may detain the respondent for a reasonable time necessary to complete and serve the short form notification" (725 ILCS 5/112A-22.10(c).
 - 3. Completion of the Short Term Notification Form (Attachment D).
 a. Using the information obtained from LEADS, complete the identification section found in the upper left corner of the
 - b. Complete information in the upper right corner including the county from which the Order of Protection was issued and hearing date information, if available. If hearing information is not available, please check the "Unable to provide this information" box.
 - c. From the information provided in LEADS, check all remedies/restrictions applicable to respondent.
 - d. Complete the affidavit of service. It is **not** necessary to have this affidavit notarized.
 - e. In order to facilitate the respondent obtaining a full copy of the order, please complete the address information for the issuing county on the reverse side of the top (white) copy. See (Attachment D) for address information.
 - 4. Notification to Respondent

form.

- a. Serve the short form and explain what the respondent is required to do or must refrain from doing. Read aloud the Notice to Respondent Section.
- b. Explain to the respondent that important additional information is found on the back of this form.

- 5. Notification to LEADS
 - a. <u>Immediately</u> after service notify KenCom to ensure that LEADS is updated to reflect service.
- 6. Distribution of Copies
 - a. White copy given to RESPONDENT.
 - b. Yellow copy retained by AGENCY for records. This copy will be filed by records personnel in the records room.
 - c. Pink and goldenrod copies sent to Sheriff's office in the county that issued the Order of Protection. The Sheriff's Department will send the goldenrod copy on to the court.
- G. Entry into Law Enforcement Agencies Data System (LEADS)

The County Sheriff shall be responsible for entering all Orders of Protection into the LEADS system on the same day the order is issued by the court whether or not the order has been served.

H. Violations

It is a crime for a respondent to violate the conditions imposed by an Order of Protection. Jurisdiction exists where the act(s) of violating the order occur. An arrest can be made in any county where a violation occurs. The Order of Protection need not be issued in the County where the violation occurs to be valid. If an Order of Protection is in effect and an Officer has probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, an arrest shall be made.

- 1. A warrant is not necessary to arrest for violation of Order of Protection if the Officer has probable cause to believe an Order of Protection has been violated 750 ILCS 60/301.
- 2. The victim(s) should not be required to sign a complaint, but only to make a report of the violation. The Officer who takes the report may make the arrest without a warrant or cause a warrant to be issued by signing a complaint for the violation of the order.
- 3. The offense of Violation of Order of Protection should be issued even if other charges are pending.
- 4. Reports of violation of Orders of Protection should be treated like any other offense of Domestic Violence and investigated and reported as hereinafter provided in Sections II and III.
- 5. An Order of Protection is valid regardless of how the offender obtained entry into the victim's residence. Persons protected by an Order of Protection do not have the power to waive an Order of Protection. Only a court can vacate an Order of Protection.
- 6. Never arrest any person listed as a protected person for violating an Order of Protection.

X. Bail/Bond

Many arrested offenders will be eligible to post a bond to secure their release from custody after a bond hearing. Those who do so must be reminded by the Officer that the offender is prohibited from having any contact with the victim for 72 hours, or returning to the residence, as a condition of bond, and that a violation of this provision will result in the offender's arrest and prosecution. This applies to any arrest for any violation of statute where the victim is a family or household member. The following statutes govern bond procedures:

A. <u>Illinois Supreme Court Rule 528(d)</u> – No bail is established under these rules as provided in section 110-15 of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 (725 ILCS 5/110-15) for the offense of Domestic Battery (720 ILCS 5/12-3.2), a violation of an order of protection (720 ILCS 5/12-30), or any similar violation of a local ordinance. Bail for these offenses shall be set by the court pursuant to statute,

*Note – 725 ILCS 5/110-15 – sets proscribed amounts for bail for certain crimes.

- B. 725 ILCS 5/110-5.1 Bail; certain persons charged with violent crimes against family or household members (a) Subject to subsection (c), a person who is charged with a violent crime shall appear before the court for the setting of bail if the alleged victim was a family or household member at the time of the alleged offense, and if any of the following applies:
 - (1) The person charged, at the time of the alleged offense, was subject to the terms of an order of protection...or was previously convicted of a violation of an order of protection...or a violence crime if the victim was a family or household member at the time of the offense or a violation of a substantially similar municipal ordinance or law of this or any other state or the United States if the victim was a family or household member at the time of the offense;
 - (2) The arresting officer indicates in a police report or other document accompanying the complaint any of the following:
 - (A) That the arresting officer observed on the alleged victim objective manifestations of physical harm that the arresting officer reasonably believes are a result of the alleged offense;
 - (B) That the arresting officer reasonably believes that the person had on the person's person at the time of the alleged offense a deadly weapon;
 - (C) That the arresting officer reasonably believes that the person presents a credible threat of serious physical harm to the alleged victim or to any other person if released on bail before trial.

Subsection (c) – allows the defendant to be heard by video bond call.

- C. <u>725 ILCS 120/3(c) Definition of Violent Crime</u> any felony in which force or threat of force was used against the victim, or any offense involving sexual exploitation, sexual conduct or sexual penetration, or a violation of section 11-20.1 or 11-20.3 of the Criminal Code of 1961, domestic battery, violation of an order of protection, stalking, or any misdemeanor which results in death or great bodily harm to the victim or any violation of Section 9-3 of the Criminal Code of 1961, or section 11-501 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, or a similar provision of a local ordinance, if the violation resulted in personal injury or death, and includes any action committed by a juvenile that would be a violent crime if committed by an adult.
- D. 725 ILCS 5/110-10(a)(5) Determining the Amount of Bail and Conditions of Release The court may order a person to surrender all firearms in his/her possession to a Law Enforcement Officer (and such firearms shall be impounded) if that person has been charged with, among other things, stalking, aggravated stalking, or domestic battery. All legally possessed firearms shall be returned upon that person completing a sentence for a conviction on a misdemeanor domestic battery; upon the charges being dismissed, or if the

person is found not guilty, unless the finding of not guilty is by reason of insanity (725 ILCS 5/110-10(a)(5)).

The Violation of Bail Bond Statute (720 ILCS 5/32-10) has been amended to add a Class A Misdemeanor offense for a violation of the statutory bond provision noted above. Therefore, if a defendant returns to the victim's residence or contacts the victim in any way within 72 hours of having been released on bond for a Domestic Violence case, he/she should be prosecuted for the offense of violation of bail bond.

<u>NOTE:</u> It shall be the responsibility of the Investigation Division to verify that a subject is in compliance with the Bail Bond order as it relates to their Firearms, Ammunition, F.O.I.D. (Firearms Owners Identification Card) or other dangerous weapons.

NOTE: Pursuant to the IDVA the 72-hour rule would apply to any case in which the victim and defendant are family or household members (i.e. disorderly conduct, theft, criminal damage to property, criminal trespass, etc.).

<u>NOTE:</u> No bail is permitted for violating the 72-hour no contact provision of bail following release on an arrest for Domestic Violence offenses.

For a Bischof violation, see KenCom Bischof Protocol.

XI. Incident Reporting and Documentation

In accordance with the IDVA, every Law Enforcement Officer investigating an alleged incidence of abuse, neglect, or exploitation between family or household members shall make a written police report of any bona fide allegation and the disposition of such investigation.

Whether or not an arrest is made, it is important that the responding Officer document his/her activity. Documentation is particularly necessary in cases involving Domestic Violence because victims often place several calls for police assistance before leaving their abuser or the conflict between the parties is otherwise resolved. This section describes what information the Officer should record.

- A. If a subject is arrested for a Domestic Violence incident, the Domestic Violence Report Addendum (Attachment A) and the Domestic Violence Supplemental Report (Attachment B) forms are to be completed. A copy of both forms must accompany the subject for bond call; they are to be attached to the synopsis form, left with booking and sent via email to the State's Attorney's Office. In the case of an adult arrestee, the Domestic Violence Supplemental Report must be faxed to Mutual Ground. This shall not occur if the incident involves a juvenile offender.
 - 1. If a complaint is signed against a subject and a warrant is pending, the Domestic Violence Report (Attachment A) and the Domestic Violence Supplemental Report (Attachment B) forms are to be completed. A copy of both forms must accompany the report paperwork when requesting a warrant, attached to the synopsis form and sent via email to the State's Attorney's Office. In the case of an adult arrestee, the Domestic Violence Supplemental Report must be faxed to Mutual Ground. This shall not occur if the incident involves a juvenile offender.^{2, 10}
- B. If no arrest is made, the investigating Officer is strongly encouraged to refer the complaining parties to the State's Attorney's Office for consideration of charges. In the case of an adult offender, it is permissible, however not mandatory, to

complete and fax a Domestic Violence Supplemental Report (Attachment B) to Mutual Ground regarding the incident. This shall not occur if the incident involves a juvenile offender.

- C. If no arrest is made when the suspect is present, the report should clearly show sufficient reasons for not making an arrest.
- D. Often victims are too afraid to testify against batterers, and the State's Attorney must proceed without the victim's cooperation. The Officer's report will replace some of the testimony that would otherwise have been given by the victim.
- E. It is essential Officers report all spontaneous or excited utterances, because spontaneous or excited utterances are exceptions to the hearsay rule and are admissible in court even if the victim does not show up in person.
- F. Every Officer investigating a Domestic Violence incident shall prepare a written report that does the following:
 - 1. Documents and describes injuries.
 - 2. Includes photographic evidence of injuries and the scene.
 - 3. Describes the victim's physical appearance.
 - 4. Includes statements as to the frequency and severity of prior incidents by the same person, including information about the use of weapons.
 - 5. Describes the suspect's attitude and appearance.
 - 6. Describes the crime scene.
 - 7. Includes the presence of children, elderly or disabled.
 - 8. Includes statements from victim, suspect and witnesses.
 - 9. Includes the number of prior requests for police assistance.
 - Notes the victim was advised of his/her rights under the Illinois
 Domestic Violence Act as well as the Rights of Crime Victims and
 Witnesses Act and that other mandated responsibilities were fulfilled. 11
 - 11. Describes the emotional state of all persons involved and their location upon arrival.
 - 12. Notes medical care rendered at the scene and/or at medical facility.
 - 13. Identifies relationship of the victim to the offender.
 - 14. Identifies a person through whom the victim can be contacted.
 - 15. Notes all other circumstances pertinent to the incident.
 - 16. Includes the Domestic Violence Report (Attachment A)
 - 17. Includes the Domestic Violence Supplemental Report (Attachment B)

Do not list Victim's temporary location in the report. The suspect's attorney may obtain and pass along this information.

NOTE: If minor children are present and if the Officer reasonably believes they have been abused or neglected, the Officer is a mandated reporter and MUST call the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services at (800)25-ABUSE.

- F. If the Officer has reason to suspect that a family or household member aged 60 or older is abused, neglected, or exploited, the Officer is a mandated reporter and must call the Illinois Department on Aging, Elder Abuse and Neglect Program at (800)252-8966 or the local designated elder abuse provider agency. If an arrest is not made, the Officer should clearly document the circumstances of the incident in the report.
- G. The supervising officer shall review all Domestic Violence Reports.

XII. **Victim Services**

- A. The responding Officer shall make referral(s) to the victim whether or not an arrest has been made. Local services may include but not limited to:
 - Hospital Emergency Rooms. 1.
 - 2. Local Domestic Violence Programs
 - 3. Elder Abuse Programs.
 - 4. Community Mental Health Agencies.
 - 5. Local Sexual Assault Crisis Center.
 - 6. Youth Service Providers.
 - 7. Homeless Shelters.

XIII. Limited Law Enforcement Liability

Some Officers may be concerned about the extent to which they could be liable for what they do or do not do. Section 112A-31 of the Illinois Domestic Violence Act of 1986 (725 ILCS 5/112A-31) limits an Officer's and his/her agency's liability: "Any act of omission or commission by any Law Enforcement Officer acting in good faith in rendering emergency assistance or otherwise enforcing this act shall not impose civil liability upon the Law Enforcement Officer or his/her Supervisor or employer, unless the act is a result of willful or wanton misconduct".

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Illinois Domestic Violence Act Victim Information

from the Office of Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan

Domestic violence is a crime. Any person who hits, chokes, kicks, threatens, harasses, or interferes with the personal liberty of another family or household member has broken Illinois domestic violence law. Under Illinois law family or household members are defined as:

- family members related by blood or marriage;
- people who are married or used to be married;
- people who share or used to share a home, apartment, or other dwelling,
 - people who have or say they have a child in common;
- people who have or say they have a blood relationship through a child;
 - · people who are dating or used to date, including same sex couples; and
 - people with disabilities and their personal assistants.

Orders of Protection

An order of protection is a court order which restricts someone who has abused a family or household member. An order of protection may:

- prohibit abuser from continuing threats and abuse (abuse includes physical abuse, harassment, intimidation, etc.);
- order abuser out of a shared home or residence;
- order abuser out of that home while they are using drugs or alcohol;
- order abuser to stay away from you and other persons protected by the order and keep abuser from your work, school, or other specific locations;
- prohibit abuser from taking or hiding children, give you temporary custody, or require the abuser to bring the child to court;
 - require abuser to attend counseling;
- require abuser to turn weapons over to local law enforcement; and/or
- prohibit abuser from other actions.

To Obtain an Order of Protection, You Can:

- Contact a domestic violence program for help completing the forms.
 - Ask your attorney to file in civil court.
- Request an order with your divorce.
- Request an order during a criminal prosecution.
- Go to your local circuit court clerk's office and get papers to seek an order of protection for yourself.

Law Enforcement Response

Law enforcement should try to prevent further abuse by:

- arresting the abuser when appropriate and completing a police report;
 - driving you to a medical facility, shelter or safe place or arranging for transportation to a safe place;
- · accompanying you back to your home to get belongings; and
- telling you about the importance of saving evidence, such as damaged clothing or property, and taking photographs of injuries or damage.

Criminal Prosecutions

If an arrest wasn't made and you wish to seek criminal charges against your abuser, bring all relevant information, including the police report number and this form, to your local state's attorney. You may want to contact a local domestic violence program so they can help you through the system.

If Abuser Contacts You After an Arrest

If the abuser was charged with a crime and you or another victim is a family or household member, that abuser probably was ordered not to contact you for at least 72 hours. If the abuser does contact you soon after an arrest, you should call the police because the abuser can be charged with an additional crime: violation of bail bond.

Violation of an Order of Protection

You should also call police if the abuser disregards a part of the order of protection, because that is another crime: violation of an order of protection. If arrested for this crime, your abuser may be required to have a risk assessment evaluation and wear an electronic monitoring device.

Información para Victimas Sobre la Ley de Illinois Contra la Violencia Doméstica

de la Oficina de la Procuradora de Illinois Lisa Madigan

La violencia doméstica es un delito. Cualquier persona que pega, estrangula, vatea, amenaza, acosa, o interfiere con la libertad personal de otro miembro de a familia o de la casa ha quebrantado la ley. De acuerdo con la ley de Illinois os miembro de la familia o de la casa se definen como:

- personas que son familia directa o por matrimonio;
- personas que están o estaban casados;
- personas que comparten o han compartido un mismo hogar;
- personas que han tenido o dicen que tienen un hijo en común;
- personas que tienen o dicen que tienen relaciones consanguíneas a través de un hijo;
- personas que están saliendo juntos o estaban salíendo juntos, incluso las parejas del mísmo sexo; y
- personas con incapacidades y sus asistentes personales.

Ordenes de Proteceión

Una orden de protección es una orden de la corte que impone restricciones en Ilguien que ha abusado a un miembro de la familia o del hogar. Una orden de protección puede:

- prohibir que un abusador continúe con sus amenazas y abusos (el abuso incluye abuso físico, acoso, intimidación, interferencia con la libertad personal, la privación deliberada, etc.);
- ordena que el abusador se vaya de un hogar compartido;
- ordena que el abusador se vaya del hogar mientras continúe tomando drogas o alcohol;
- ordena que el abusador no se acerque a Usred y otras personas que están protegidos bajo la orden y asegure que el abusador no visite su trabajo, su escuela, o otros lugares específicos;
- prohibir que el abusador se lleve los hijos, darle a Usted custodia provisional, o requiere que el abusador lleve el hijo a la corre;
- requiere que cl abusador se someta a consejería;
- requiere que el abusador entregue sus armas a la policía local; y/o
 - prohibir que el abusador tome otras acciones.

Para Obtener Una Orden de Protección Usted Puede:

- llamar y pedir asistencia al programa más cercano de asistencia contra la violencia doméstica;
- pedirle a su abogado que le somera una perición en una corre civil;
 - solicitar una orden junto con el proceso del divorcio;
- solicitar una orden en el transcurso de una demanda criminal; o
- ir a la oficina de la secretaria del circuito local y pedir la papelería necesaria.

La Respuesta de los Oficiales de la Ley

Los oficiales de la ley deben tratar de prevenir abuso futuro a través de:

- detener al abusador cuando es apropiado y llenar el teporte de policía;
- llevarle a Usted a un lugar de servicio médico, a un refugio o a un lugar seguro o arregiar un transporte para llevarle a un lugar seguro;
 - acompañarle a casa para recoger sus cosas; y
- hablarle sobre la importancia de guardar evidencia, como ropa o propiedades dañados, y tomando fotos de sus heridas o el daño.

Cargos eriminales

Si no se ha hecho un arresto y Usted desea hacer cargos criminales contra el abusadot, llévele al fiscal local toda la información pertinente, incluyendo el número del reporte de policía y ese mismo documento. Le puede ayudar que primero se contacte con un programa local contra la violencia doméstica para que ellos le puedan apoyar en el proceso.

Si el abusador se pone en contacto con usted después de un arresto

Cuando a una persona se le acusa de una ofensa criminal y la víctima es un "miembro de la familia o de la casa," a no ser que ya se haya dispuesto en una corte, al abusador se le prohibe a tener contacto o comunicarse con la víctima y entrar o quedarse en la residencia de la víctima por un mínimo de 72 horas. Si el acusado/abusador viola estas restricciones, se debe de llamar a la policía inmediaramente. Al acusado se le pueden imponer otros cargos por no cumplir con las condiciones de la fianza.

Violación de una Orden de Protección

También debe de llamar a la policía si el abusador ignora una restricción de la Orden de Protección porque eso es otro crimen que se conoce como: violación de una orden de protección.

Instructions for the Online Short Form Notification Respondents in Custody

The Online Short Form Notification (online short form) shall be used to effectuate service of unserved Orders of Protection, Civil No Contact Orders and Stalking No Contact Orders upon respondents while in custody of law enforcement or the Illinois Department of Corrections.

- 1. General instructions.
 - Print pages 1 and 2 of the online short form from the website of the Office of the Illinois Attorney General (www.IllinoisAttorneyGeneral.gov).
- 2. Fill out the first page of the online form using the information obtained from LEADS.
 - Check the box identifying the type of order.
 - Complete the identification and court sections at the top of the form. If hearing information is not available, write "not available" on the "Location" line.
 - In the area for the remedies for the order being served, check all applicable remedies/restrictions. The numbers of the remedies/restrictions on the short form correspond to the number in the LEADS information. Currently, LEADS information regarding Civil and Stalking No Contact Orders is located under Box 17 of Orders of Protection.
 - Write the name of the county that issued the order in the space provided on the back of the Respondent's Copy of the order.
 - Complete the Affidavit of Service on the bottom of the page. It is not necessary to sign before a notary.
 - Make three copies of the completed first page of the online form.
 - Staple page 2 of the online form (Notice To Respondent) to the original of the first page.
- 3. Serving the online form on the respondent.
 - Serve the 2-page stapled form on the respondent and explain each condition. Read the "Notice to respondent." Emphasize that the order is now in effect, the respondent may be subject to arrest for violating the order and the respondent is responsible for obtaining a full copy of the protective order. Inform the respondent that further explanation of his/her rights and obligations is stapled to the online short form notification.
- 4. Distribution of copies of the online form.
 - Keep one copy of the online form for your agency.
 - Send two copies to the sheriff's office where the order was issued.
- 5. Distribution by the sheriff's office.
 - Follow LEADS protocol in updating the protective order entry.
 - Send one of the copies to the court for inclusion in the court file within 48 hours of receipt.

The order is now enforceable. You must report to the office of the sheriff or the office of the circuit court in _____ County to obtain a copy of the order. You are subject to arrest and may be charged with a misdemeanor or felony if you violate any of the terms of the order.

You may also be subject to federal penalties for possessing, transporting, or accepting a firearm or ammunition under the Gun Control Act (18 U.S.C. § 922 9(q)(8)).

STATEMENT OF CRIME VICTIMS' RIGHTS

If you are the victim of a violent crime, the Illinois Constitution and Rights of Crime Victims and Witnesses Act give you the following rights:

- 1. The right to be treated with fairness and respect for your dignity and privacy and to be free from harassment, intimidation, and abuse throughout the criminal justice process.
- 2. The right to notice and to a hearing before a court ruling on a request for access to any of the victim's records, information, or communications which are privileged or confidential by law.
- 3. The right to timely notification of all court proceedings.
- 4. The right to communicate with the prosecution.
- The right to be heard at any post-arraignment court proceeding in which a right of the victim is at issue and any court proceeding involving a post-arraignment release decision, plea, or sentencing.
- 6. The right to be notified of information about the conviction, sentence, imprisonment, and release of the accused.

- 7. The right to timely disposition of the case following the arrest of the accused.
- 8. The right to be reasonably protected from the accused throughout the criminal justice process.
- The right to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in denying or fixing the amount of bail, determining whether to release the defendant, and setting conditions of release after arrest and conviction.
- 10. The right to be present at the trial and all other court proceedings on the same basis as the accused, unless the victim is to testify and the court determines that the victim's testimony would be materially affected if the victim hears other testimony at the trial.
- 11. The right to have present at all court proceedings, subject to the rules of evidence, an advocate and other support person of the victim's choice.
- 12. The right to restitution.

While police are investigating the crime, you can ask them for information about the status of the investigation.

You can also request to meet with the prosecutor, if the police forward the case to the State's Attorney's Office.
